

# Japan's Role in Asia: New Dynamics, New Directions

**Special Public Lecture Series presented by the Asia Research Centre**

To foster a deeper understanding of the contemporary political and economic forces shaping Japan's engagement with Asia and the implications of this for Australia, the Asia Research Centre at Murdoch University presents a special public lecture series involving three leading Japanese scholars. Far-reaching political and economic reforms are being countenanced within Japan that are the subject of widespread domestic debate and discussion. Meanwhile, new geopolitical realities such as the increased significance of India and China within the region combine with traditional security questions over Taiwan and North Korea to throw into question Japan's defence and security approach within Asia. These pressures have added to the domestic debate about Japanese national identity as well as defence and foreign policy, the outcomes of which will be of crucial consequence for regional prosperity and stability.
