Untying the Gordian Knot? The Difficulties in Solving Violence in Southern Thailand

A Public Lecture presented by Chaiwat Satha-Anand
Thammasat University, Bangkok

Dr Chaiwat Satha-Anand teaches violence and non-violence in politics at the Faculty of Political Science at Thammasat University, Bangkok. Among other positions, he serves as the Director of the Peace Information Centre, Foundation for Democracy and Development Studies as well as the Vice-president of the Strategic Nonviolence Committee, the Thai National Security Council. Currently a Senior Research Scholar with the Thailand Research Fund, he heads a three year research project on non-violence and violence in Thai Society. His recent works both in Thai and English include *The Life of this World: Negotiated Muslim Lives in Thai Society* (Marshall Cavendish, 2005); *Living Weapons? A Critical Perspective on Violence* (Fa Diew Kan, 2006); *Violence and Truth Management: Half a century of Pattani* (Thammasat University Press, forthcoming); *Nonviolence and the Islamic Imperatives* (University Press of America, forthcoming). Some of his writings have been translated into Bahasa Indonesia, Japanese, German, Italian and Arabic. He was the Technical Director of the National Reconciliation Commission appointed by the former Thai Prime Minister to find peaceful ways to end violence in Southern Thailand.
